Safe Streets Baltimore is a Mayor's Office of Community Safety and Engagement program geared to reducing shooting and homicides in high-risk communities. This program is an evidence-based, public health program targeting high-risk individuals know to carry firearms or could become a victim of a shooting. Safe Streets is modeled after Chicago's Cure Violence Program and employs outreach professionals to deescalate and mediate disputes that might otherwise result in serious violence. Outreach Professionals are Violence Interrupters that are identified as credible messengers in select communities that house this program. These individuals at one time were high-risk themselves. They can navigate through high-risk communities because they have relationships with individuals identified as high-risk.

High-risk individuals are identified as someone who could possibly be a shooter or be shot themselves. These persons become program participants of Safe Streets.

Safe Streets sites are selected by BPD data that displays a community being in the top 25% percentile of locations where gun violence occurs in the city. Even though Safe Streets sites use BPD data, local sites do not work with BPD. This could jeopardize the credibility of the staff and the safety of the physical site.

A Community Based Organization is selected to oversee the Safe Streets site in a specific community. The CBO is responsible for ensuring that staff members are successfully serving the community and that necessary resources are being provided to program participants and community members as well.
